A Message From Rabbi Brodkin

Dear Friends.

I hope you enjoyed a refreshing summer! As we approach 5784, we look forward to a sweet New Year. 5783 was a time of change and fulfillment for me. I experienced change in moving to a new community, and fulfillment in connecting with family and our new Kehila.

One of my goals in moving to the east coast was to gain more access to my kids. To that affect, it was gratifying to get involved in my son, Dov's, medical school application process. In one application essay, Dov wrote about growing up in Portland.



Dov explained that we were constantly hosting folks in our home, and he learned to communicate with all types of people. "During my childhood," he wrote, "we weren't taught 'how can we make things easier for us?' rather, 'what can we do to make others feel welcome?'"

This recollection is accurate. From veteran congregants to potential converts, Jewish neighbors or visitors, we hosted a myriad of people over the years. In fact, I recall running after Dov at age four while entertaining guests in our Sukkah. This past year, we began to host folks in our New Jersey home, and we hope for many more similar occasions.

I felt joy reading Dov's lessons learned from our home. We must constantly ask ourselves: how can we make others feel welcome? This lesson began with Avraham who welcomed guests to his tent.

How we make people feel welcome is a central question at any synagogue. After all, involvement in Shul life is not a mere transaction; it's a transformation. Becoming part of a Shul means that person starting to identify with the synagogue as one's spiritual home.

Here at B'nai Israel, we strive to keep this question at the forefront of our mind. When someone new walks into Shul, how can we make sure they find the right page in the Siddur, know their way around the building, or have someone to sit with at our Kiddush?

As we build on our welcoming environment, word will get out that B'nai Israel is THE place to be part of the Jewish community. It's my hope that every person—be they longtime member or passerby—will feel at home in our embrace.

In the spirit of welcoming, I hope you will enjoy our new quarterly format of The Voice. This Fall/High Holiday edition is designed to "welcome" and prepare you for the 5784 High Holiday experience.


A Message From Our President - Jay Fields



4) Supporting our minyanim. It is imperative for an orthodox shul to have a daily minyan. We need your support! If each man would commit to two days a month or ideally one day per week, we would go a long way to solving this issue.

5) Expanding the eruv. While there is an eruv in our area, it does not encompass the housing behind our Shul. It is our goal to have this completed over the coming twelve months. An eruv is an important item for an orthodox community, especially for young families.

As you can see, we are working hard to move our Shul forward. We have scheduled board meetings on the third Tuesday of every month. Board meetings are open to all members. If you have any items that you wish to bring to the Board, please let me know or feel free to attend in person.

room, clean / repair various aspects of our building, and hire a dedicated program manager to further boost our programming, learning opportunities and community involvement.





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
